Take your rubbish home with you. There are no refuse containers on the islands. Put out your cigarette butts and take them back with you.



Do not pick any flowers or fruit. They are necessary for development of plants and for feeding many





The lighting of fires is prohibited.



Do not make any noise that may disturb the peace.



Do not take any shells from the beach or any other natural element.



Camping is only permited on the campsite.





Sport fishing is prohibited.



Drones and kites are forbidden.



Do not disturb or feed the animals. Nor do mussels, limpets, periwinkles, etc tear off the rocks.



Do not stray from signposted paths. Don't access dunes or cliffs. Your safety and conservation of many species depend on it.



#### DID YOU KNOW THAT ...?

...the beach sand is so fine and white because its quartz grains are thousands of years old?

This sand comes from the erosion of granite—the most abundant rock on these coasts. The white sand is made up of quartz—a mineral that is highly resistant to erosion. The darker sand, of softer minerals, has been disappearing. Do not take any shells or sand home with you.

### A NATIONAL PARK HIDDEN UNDER THE WATER

This is a very unique protected space, since most of its surface is sea. The islands of Cíes, Ons and Sálvora emerge, creating a natural barrier that protects the Rias Baixas from the harshness of the ocean, while Cortegada is sheltered by the ria.

# DIFFERENT LANDSCAPES TO GET TO KNOW ON THE ISLAND:

THE BEACHES are located on the calmer part of the coast, where the sea deposits its sand. These sands are retained by the dune plants, thus preventing beach erosion.




THE EDGES OF THE CLIFF, in the most exposed coast, where the sea hits the rocks. Shhh ...! There is a nursery for sea birds.



THE SCRUB. Gorse bushes are protected by their thorns and serve as a refuge for many animals. Their spectacular flowers tinge the islands with yellow in spring.

#### PORTA LIGHTHOUSE TOUR

Distance: Information point-Porta lighthouse 2,6km Duration (ONE WAY): 1h Height variation: 55 m

The Campá detour allow us a bird's eye view of the lake

The least steep of the walks, and entirely by the sea. Walkers can see fish in the lake, the beach and the Nosa Señora Dunes as well as the rocky landscape of the "Freu da Porta", from the lighthouse of the same name.

Beach and The Lake to the viewpoint from the Cíes lighthouse, with the

expanse of the ocean to one side and the Vigo ria to the other point.

A path which rises gently from the Rodas Beach to the steep Alto do Príncipe cliffs. Along the way walkers will see gorses and blackthorns, a sample of the islands' native vegetation.



#### PEITO LIGHTHOUSE ROUTE

Distance: Information point-Faro do Peito 2,5km Duration (ONE WAY): 1h Height variation: 60m

This route take us around the North Island, from the Muxieiro Dune to the Monteagudo cliffs, from where we can marvel at the view of the island of Ons, and the Costa da Vela cliffs.
